DEPARTMENT SPONSORED EVENTS

During the month of June, Largo Fire participated in eight public events that reached approximately 542 people in the areas of fire safety programs, home safety preparedness programs and fall prevention. Seven smoke detectors were installed.

On June 29th Largo Fire Rescue hosted their 5th Annual Hurricane Preparedness Expo at the Largo Public Library. Over 160 citizens attended to learn about preparedness steps for before, during, and after a significant storm. Truck 41 displayed a 35 ft storm surge banner to depict the true height of a disastrous storm surge, and a presentation was given by a speaker's panel consisting of 10 News Chief Meteorologist Bobby Deskins, Fire Chief Chad Pittman and Public Educator Summer Mahr, Largo Police Department's Sgt. Amanda Misner, Pinellas County Emergency Management, Animal Services,

Consumer Protection, and Duke Energy. Multiple safety and emergency preparedness agencies were on site in the vendor room to distribute information, and each citizen was greeted with a mini hurricane preparedness kit and a 2019 "Surviving the Storm" Hurricane Guide.

BUDGET UPDATE

For the month of June, Fire has experienced a total of 1,551.25 hours of overtime. Minimum staffing accounted for or 801 hours of the overtime at a cost of \$29,328.29. Special events, department committees, and training account for the remainder of the overtime assignments.
